

ANESTHESIA ROTATION ORIENTATION SHEET

Welcome to the Anesthesia Rotation. Here are a few tips to get you started with the rotation:

FIRST THINGS FIRST:

1. From the Sparrow Hospital Library check out “Basics of Anesthesia”, by Stoelting and Miller
2. If at all possible prior to this rotation, access the Physicians’ Anesthesia service website on Sparrow’s intranet or (paspc.org) and obtain:
 - **Anesthesia Rotation Handout**
 - **Anesthesia Rotation Orientation Sheet**
 - Anesthesia Trainee Guidance Sheet
 - Activity Chart
 - Multiple choice tests- 3 to go thru as you will, complete the one that corresponds with your rotation and turn in to your rotation coordinator.
 - **Link to the New England Journal of Medicine and watch:**
 - Placement of an Arterial Line
 - Orotracheal Intubation
 - Central Venous Catheterization
 - Positive Pressure Ventilation with a face Mask and Bag-valve
 - Central Venous Catheterization-Subclavian

Beginning Date of Rotation:

Go to the operating room in the Neuman Wing at 0700 on your first day, check in with the main OR desk and receive a locker that can be used during your rotation. Introduce yourself to the board runner (at main OR desk) then wait in the anesthesia office until one of the anesthesiologists assigns you to your mentor. Leave between 16:30 and 17:30 depending on what is going on.

WHERE to find rooms:

Operating rooms 1-5, 7-10, 12, 14-15 is in the Neuman Wing

Operating rooms 16-21 are in the West Wing Tower

WHO: Medical Students – You will be assigned by an anesthesiologist to a room and anesthesia provider to stay with through out the day.

Residents in Internal Medicine – You will be assigned to a room of interest to work with a given anesthesia provider throughout the day for longitudinal exposure to the perioperative period.

Residents in Emergency Medicine – Obtain a schedule in the morning and move from room to room throughout the day to maximize your exposure to airway management and invasive line placement

Residents in Pediatrics – Obtain an OR schedule in the morning and move from room to room throughout the day to maximize your exposure to airway management. If you can get into a room with Pediatrics, prioritize those rooms. If there are no pediatric cases available that are appropriate for you to participate in, then find adult rooms to improve you airway skills for older pediatric patients.

NOTE: *Medical Students have the priority of picking a room for the day since they may be making a decision as to whether to enter anesthesia as a profession.*
